FAASteam Safety Seminar

The General Aviation Joint Steering Committee (GAJSC) reviews information relating to general aviation accidents. This information is then used as a "Topic of the Month" for presentations each month by the FAA Safety Team (FAASTeam). We will take a look at recommendations from work group studies on aircraft loss of control (LOC) involving stabilized approaches and go-arounds. In the last ten years there were more than 1,200 fatal accidents, many which occurred in the approach phase of flight. These accidents resulted by an un-stabilized approach or a failure to execute a successful go-around. Aircraft icing is also a major concern during winter operations. Come join us as we hear FAA Aviation Safety Inspector Jeff Boe discuss winter aircraft maintenance operations. During the colder season, aircraft owners and pilots need to consider additional items during the pre-flight inspection and aircraft storage. Pilots flying in very cold temperatures can introduce unwanted mechanical and maintenance issues which contribute to wintertime aircraft accidents.
