Dear Inspection Authorization Holder:

This letter is provided to ensure your application for this year's inspection authorization renewal cycle contains sufficient evidence for your authorization renewal.

14CFR § 65.91 sets forth the eligibility requirements for obtaining an inspection authorization (IA). Among other requirements, an applicant must "have been actively engaged, for at least the two-year period before the date he applies, in maintaining aircraft certificated and maintained in accordance with [FAA regulations]." 14 CFR § 65.93(a) sets forth the eligibility requirements for renewing an IA and incorporates the requirements for obtaining one under 14 CFR § 65.91 (c) (1)-(4). Accordingly, an individual must be actively engaged, for at least the prior two-year period, in maintaining aircraft to be eligible to either obtain or renew an IA.

Current FAA guidance describes actively engaged as having an active role in exercising the privileges of an A&P mechanic certificate in the maintenance of civil aircraft. Applicants who inspect, overhaul, repair, preserve, or replace parts on aircraft, or who supervise (i.e., direct and inspect) those activities, are actively engaged. The FAA may use evidence or documentation provided by the applicant showing inspection, overhaul, repair, preservation, or replacement of parts on aircraft or supervision of these activities.

This evidence or documentation could include records showing performance or supervision of aircraft maintenance, return to service documents, and/or copies of maintenance record entries to determine the type of maintenance activity performed, considering any special expertise required. The quantity of maintenance activity demonstrates if the applicant was actively engaged. Please note that refresher-training attendance alone does not satisfy those requirements.

Based upon the guidance it is important that you as an IA holder describe your maintenance activity in block 11 of FAA Form 8610-1 as accurately as possible and with enough information to establish that you have been actively engaged since the last renewal period. You are welcomed and encouraged to use an activity record to supplement your application. FAA Form 8610-1, Pilot Bill of Rights (PBR) with acknowledgment, activity record, and additional resources may be found on the Alabama and Northwest Florida Flight Standards District Office web site at http://www.faa.gov/about/office org/field offices/fsdo/anf/.

Please ensure that your renewal package is postmarked or hand delivered on or before March 31, 2015 and contains the following information:

- Two (2) complete and signed FAA Form 8610-1 (required)
- Two (2) copies of FAA approved 8-hour refresher course completion certificates, if used
- 3. Two (2) signed acknowledgment of receipt of PBR written notification (required)
- 4. Two copies renewal evidence (activity form), if used.
- 5. FAA Form 8310-5, Inspection Authorization Card (required)

- (e) Providing information about enforcement actions, or orders issued thereunder, to Federal agencies, the aviation industry, and the public upon request.
- (f) Making records of delinquent civil penalties owed to the FAA available to the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) for collection pursuant to 31 USC 3711(g).
